

In-progress Safety Investigation Statement

After 1:30 hours of a navigation flight, the engine of the Cessna F-150L aircraft stopped. The pilot made an emergency landing on a cultivated field.

The pilot and passenger climbed out of the aircraft uninjured.

After landing, the RH Tank was found empty and the LH Tank with 12 – 14 liters (corresponding with the qty of unusable fuel).

The aircraft showed no damage after the landing. It was able to take-off on the next day, after the Belgian CAA cleared the area as a temporary airfield.
